Grant Update: Unrestricted Funds Supporting Early Learning Coalition Development



Last summer the RCCF awarded its first proactive grant to Huffer Childcare Resource and Referral to hire an Early Learning Coordinator. Jeri McCorkle was hired and has been doing research and working with childcare providers, schools, businesses, and nonprofit organizations throughout the community since September to get an understanding of the current state of the child in Rush County. This spring, the development of an Early Learning Coalition "First5" will occur, bringing together a range of community members, employers, educators, caretakers, healthcare providers, etc. to disseminate the data and begin identifying opportunities for improving resources for children and families in our community.

After months of research, the RCCF Board of Directors recognized the importance of investing in early learning. Building on a strong foundation of early learning not only leads to greater success in school, it is an essential factor in growing the success of individuals and businesses throughout the community. Research has found a 13% return on investment for high-quality, early education. In the coming months, you can look forward to articles sharing more impressive data on the impact of investment in early learning and how Rush County hopes to make a lasting impact on our residents and community through our decision to invest in this cause.
