Rush to Help: COVID-19 Rapid Relief Fund

Help is on the way for Rush County organizations impacted by the COVID-19 crisis. RCCF has established the Rush to Help COVID-19 Rapid Relief Fund to assist local organizations addressing immediate needs as well as short- and long-term effects of the outbreak and recovery from the pandemic.

The RCCF board of directors has approved the use of \$25,000 in unrestricted funds to offer support to our local community. We need help from individuals and businesses, too.

Rush County's Readiness for Change Part 4: How to Move Forward


